Through my role at Berkshire Agricultural Ventures (BAV) I've had the opportunity and privilege of establishing the BAV Market Match Fund. In two years I've fundraised and distributed over \$250,000 across 11 Berkshire farmers markets to support SNAP matching programs. These efforts have translated to over 8,000 SNAP customers served and have generated more than \$365,000 in sales for farmers. The Market Match Fund resolves systematic issues and pain points our farmers markets have been experiencing for years. By streamlining and uniforming the SNAP matching fundraising and distribution process, I have allowed SNAP beneficiaries to have consistent access to more affordable local food; ensured farmers are not only paid fairly but also receive a boost in revenue; and guaranteed farmers markets are a reliable food access point for our community. These efforts have contributed to the physical, mental and emotional wellbeing of our community.

#### Licensed Certified Social Worker (Clincian), Boston Neurobehavioral Associates



Pittsfield Police Officer, City of Pittsfield



#### Corporate Controller, Mill Town


